Coordinator's report

Welcome to ABOVAS' Annual General Meeting. My name is Denise Hupé, I'm the coordinator, of this not for profit organization. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of our Board of Directors, Nicolas Dugal, President, Paul Bissonnette, Vice-President, Caroline Goulian, Treasurer, Anne-Marie Angers-Trottier, Secretary, Thalia Chronopoulos, Administrator and Patricia Enborg, Administrator. I appreciate all that you do. And a special mention to my assistant, Isabelle Leclair, thank you for keeping me sane even if that's an insurmountable feat.

ABOVAS which is an essential accompaniment towards health would not be able to help isolated and vulnerable West Island residents get to their imperative and recurrent medical treatments and appointments without our dedicated volunteer driver/companions. We currently have 62 volunteers who do more than just drive. They help them from their houses to their vehicles; they safely drive them to their medical appointment; they guide them to the right department; they wait for them, and then they do the exact same process but in reverse order; back safe and sound to the client's home. Here's what Mrs. H, a 92-year old Pointe-Claire client recently said about one of our volunteers: 'The volunteer I had yesterday was a very friendly and polite man. He watched every move I made and I didn't have to be afraid I was going to fall at all. It was so nice to get out of the house without that fear.'

Regardless of the reason why our clients use our service, they all have one thing in common. They all have an extra weight of stress on their shoulders due to their particular health issues; whether it's cancer, a visual impairment or complications following a stroke. What our volunteer driver/companions are able to do with the high level of service that they offer, is to alleviate some, if not all, of our clients' stress. A big thank you goes to our volunteers for all of the excellent work they do. ABOVAS would not exist without you.

We are always looking for more volunteer driver companions. All that is needed is a valid license, access to a vehicle and some free time during the week. If you know of someone or if you'd be interested, please feel free to communicate with us. Flyers are available at the back of the room.

In 10 years, Accompagnement Bénévole de l'Ouest (ABOVAS) has offered more than 19 802 accompanied-transports. These accompaniments helped 2225 West Island residents get to their important medical appointments on the island of Montréal.




reaffirming the relevance of its slogan, an essential accompaniment towards health with a significant increase in the amount of accompaniments done.




The accompanied-transports

Of the 3104 accompagnied-transports done by ABOVAS, the Glen Site hospital was the destination the most requested at 22%, followed by the Lakeshore Hospital at 12% and the Jewish General at 9%.



Going to medical appointments or even more, going through a medical crisis is stressful enough whether it be a mere appointment with your doctor 32%, cancer 28%, or visual impairment related 12%, the added stress of getting there in our special weather climate with orange cones blocking our usual roads traveled is something ABOVAS clients don't need to worry about. That's what our volunteers are there for.






The majority of our volunteers live in Pierrefonds-Roxboro 23%, followed by Dollard-des-Ormeaux at 19% and Pointe-Claire with 16%. An interesting observation is that 13% of our volunteers come from outside of our territory (Ile-Perrot, Pincourt, Lachine, Lasalle and Saint-Laurent).




In an attempt to lower the average age of our volunteers, (which was 70 years old) our new recruitment plan focused on visiting seniors' clubs more and also participating in fairs. This new venture, brought the average age of our volunteers down to 65 years old.

This will be a continuous challenge but we look forward to it.



One fascinating fact is that the majority of our clients are women unlike our volunteers, where men seem to outnumber the ladies.




Statistics Canada numbers show that there is a rise in the number of seniors living in the West Island. One only needs to look at ABOVAS' stats to see the impact of this. In 2016-17 close to 81% of our clientele was over the age of 60 compared to this year, 2017-18, where 94% are.



Our clients, our reason for being, our commitment

Our Coordinator, Denise Hupé, and her assistant, Isabelle Leclair, organized the synchronization of the accompaniments and with the help of the volunteer companions offered an excellent customer service to their 910 clients, which represents a 20% increase from last year.

It's reasonable to estimate that an identical number of people are indirectly beneficiaries of this service (spouse, parent, caregiver of the accompanied person). These numbers, which come from a small organization, demonstrates that ABOVAS' service unquestionably is an essential accompaniment towards health and is an added value to the West Island community.
