
The road traveled towards health


Since its inception, Accompagnement Bénévole de l'Ouest / Volunteer Accompaniment Service (ABOVAS) has offered more than 26 568 accompanied-transports. These accompaniments helped 3 930 West Island residents get to their important medical appointments on the island of Montréal.

In 2019-2020....

 69 on average per week

ABOVAS ended another year reaffirming the relevance of its slogan, an essential accompaniment towards health with an 18% increase in the amount of accompaniments done.

Furthermore, by looking at who is referring people to us, one can notice that 76% of our references come directly from people that know our service. With our increase in our social media presence through Facebook, we had 12% more Web references.







The Glen Site hospital was the destination frequented the most by our clientele at 31%, followed by the Jewish General Hospital at 23% and the Lakeshore Hospital at 15%.

Going to medical appointments or even more, going through a medical crisis is stressful enough whether it be cancer related 28%, because of a visual impairment 18%, or a cardiovascular problem 8%, the added stress of getting there in our special weather climate with all our orange cones blocking our usual roads traveled is something ABOVAS clients don't need to worry about.











Our Volunteers, an essential part of the well-being of our community



The majority of our volunteers live in Pierrefonds-Roxboro at 21%, followed by Dollard-des-Ormeaux at 16% and Pointe-Claire with 14%.

An interesting observation is that another 14% of our volunteers come from outside of our territory (Ile-Perrot, Pincourt, Saint-Lazarre, Lachine, Lasalle and Saint-Laurent). Our volunteers have an average age of 65 years old. The youngest being 20 years old and the eldest 85 years old.



Our clients, our reason for being, our commitment



An interesting fact about our clients is that over 93% of them are over the age of 60. The youngest being 20 years old and the eldest is 101 years old. Most of our clients live in Pointe-Claire at 29%, followed by Pierrefonds-Roxboro at 28% and Dollard-des-Ormeaux with 17%.



Our Coordinator, Isabelle Leclair, organized the perfect synchronization of the accompaniments and with the help of our dedicated volunteer companions, offered an excellent customer service to our 1105 clients, which represents an increase of 20% compared to last year.

It is reasonable to estimate that an identical number of people are indirectly beneficiaries of our service (spouse, parent, caregiver of the accompanied person). These numbers, which come from a small organization, demonstrates that ABOVAS' service unquestionably is an essential accompaniment towards health and an important value to the West Island community.

The Covid-19 pandemic hit ABOVAS hard as its fiscal year came to an end. The government health and safety directives made 82% of our volunteers quarantine themselves due to their age, health conditions and/or other reasons.

Our community came to the rescue by sharing our Facebook post, helping it reach over 3000 people. Because of the help from our partners, Volunteer West Island, Community Shares, local MNAs, and those who stepped up, ABOVAS was able to continue its service.

ABOVAS' future is looking bright.

Our new strategic plan that was developed with the help of the consultant firm, COCo (Center for Community Organizations) was implemented in December 2019 and since, much has been done to improve and fortify ABOVAS.
