#### **Executive Director's report**

How to think of 2020-2021 in a positive way? Let's go through all the things ABOVAS went through this past fiscal year. In April 2020 we were cut at our knees when we lost 85% of our volunteers. Yes, the entire world was hit just as hard and many of the medical appointments were postponed indefinitely. But, we still had to help our clients going for recurring treatments. We made a call to all through our Facebook page, and with the help of our awesome partners and terrific provincial MNAs and Federal MPs, we were able to find some volunteers to help us climb out of this situation. After starting our year with only 11 volunteers, I am PROUD to say that we are finishing the year with 41 devoted volunteer companion-drivers. Many thanks to them for being there for the West Island community.

We went from doing on average 69 accompaniments per week, to 14 in just a few weeks, with record cancellations of 43 in a week. I am PROUD to say that we finished our fiscal year doing around 48 accompaniments per week. I thank Isabelle Leclair for her vigilant work in doing the schedule in these tough emotional times, all the while taking care of our clients and volunteers.

At the end of 2019, we decided to embark in a new service of Social Accompaniment. Our pilot project was in its early stages when the pandemic hit. But, we pushed forward, finished the research and started to contact ABOVAS clients and slowly but surely, it is taking shape. I am PROUD to say that we are currently doing on average 3 accompaniments a week and once people receive their second vaccine dose, we are certain that this will double if not triple. My thanks to Monica Farag, for a job well done.

The Board members and I worked hard over the years to make certain that ABOVAS could run efficiently in case of an emergency. I'm PROUD to say that we did an incredible job and even if this past year has been tough on the emotions and nerves, we were still able to keep our service running for the betterment of the West Island residents in vulnerable situations. I thank the members of our current Board of Directors for their constant support and work ethic.

This pandemic and all the mayhem that it brought, demonstrated just how much humans become fragile when you remove their social interactions but it also showed us that we are resilient, ingenious and proactive creatures. After looking back at a year that I hope never to be repeated, I in fact see everything that this organization was able to accomplish and contribute to our West Island community. I am PROUD to be the Executive Director of ABOVAS and to affirm loudly, confidently and PROUDLY that ABOVAS is an essential accompaniment towards health.



#### The road traveled towards health


Since its inception, Accompagnement Bénévole de l'Ouest / Volunteer Accompaniment Service (ABOVAS) has offered more than 28 428 accompanied-transports. These accompaniments helped 4 846 West Island residents get to their important medical appointments on the island of Montréal.



### Our Volunteers, an essential part of the well-being of our community





The majority of our 41 volunteers live in Pierrefonds/Roxboro at 20%, followed by Dollard-des-Ormeaux at 17% and Beaconsfield with 12%. An interesting observation is that 20% of our volunteers come from outside of our territory (Ile-Perrot, Pincourt, Vaudreuil-Dorion, Saint-Lazarre, Lachine, Lasalle and Saint-Laurent). Our volunteers have an average age of 64 years old. The youngest being 19 years old and the oldest 86 years old.





One can estimate that an identical number of people are indirectly beneficiaries of our service (caregiver of the accompanied person). These numbers, which come from a small organization, demonstrates that ABOVAS' service unquestionably is an essential accompaniment towards health and an important value to the West Island community.



An interesting fact about our clients is that over 93% of them are over the age of 60. The youngest being 25 years old and the oldest is 101 years old.

Most of our clients live in Pointe-Claire and in Pierrefonds/Roxboro both at 27%, followed by Dollar-des-Ormeaux at 15%.

Unfortunately, this past year, we had a record number of closed files with 370 of which 83% were due to the death of the client.

Since 2010, the head office of the organization has been housed in the offices of AVON Canada in Pointe-Claire, which represents a significant financial assistance.


















### The social stage

Our pilot project moved from the research side of things to the trial run. Our new social accompaniment service is available for ABOVAS clients only for the time being while we iron out all the kinks. In the 3 months of the trial run (for this fiscal year), we made 33 accompaniments, with an average of 3 per week.



"You have no idea what it means for me to be able to go out of my little apartment and do my own errands. Before COVID-19, I was always out and about.
