One of our clients, a 68-year-old Dollard-des-Ormeaux resident, spoke about our service during a random customer service call: 'I feel privileged to have ABOVAS' service. I am very happy to be able to finally leave my apartment. I feel safe with your volunteers. They are kind, welcoming and attentive'. Regardless of the reason why our clients use our service, they all have one thing in common. They all have an extra weight of stress on their shoulders due to their particular situation; whether it be a visual impairment, going through cancer or social isolation. What our volunteer companion-drivers are able to do with the high level of service that they offer, is alleviate some, if not all, of that stress. A big thank you goes to our volunteer companion-drivers for all of the excellent work they do. ABOVAS would not exist without them.

This year's annual report will show you how ABOVAS excelled in our medical accompaniments finishing the year with 2675 accompaniments regardless of the very confusing state of our provincial medical system. A special mention to Isabelle Leclair, the coordinator for the medical accompaniments, who did a phenomenal job with the scheduling no matter the weekly issues she had to deal with. The report will also look into the growth ABOVAS went through in January 2022 with the launching of our social accompaniment service for ALL West Island residents in vulnerable situations. Monica Farag, the coordinator for this new service, worked on 267 accompaniments in this service's inaugural

year. Thank you for the exceptional service you ladies are providing to our clientele.

The report will also show how ABOVAS has continued to follow its strategic plan while members of our Board of Directors updated it following all the changes brought on by the pandemic, like the rise of gas prices for example. I thank the members of our Board of Directors and I appreciate your constant support, work ethic and commitment to ABOVAS' mission and clientele.

Finally, the report will show without a doubt, that ABOVAS IS an essential accompaniment towards health!



The road traveled towards health


Since its inception, Accompagnement Bénévole de l'Ouest / Volunteer Accompaniment Service (ABOVAS) has offered more than 31 370 accompanied-transports. These accompaniments helped 5 700 West Island residents get to their important appointments on the island of Montréal.




By looking at who is referring people to our service, one can notice that 91% of the references came

directly from people that know our service (Clients, volunteers, health professionals and our partners).


References to our service comes from? 04/21 - 03/22






The Glen Site hospital was the destination frequented the most by our clientele at 36%, followed by the Jewish General Hospital and the

Lakeshore Hospital at 20%.



Going to medical appointments, or even more, going through a medical crisis is stressful enough. Whether it be cancer related 33%, because of a visual impairment 20%, or a cardiovascular problem 6%, the added stress of getting there in our special weather climate with all the orange

cones blocking our usual roads traveled, and with all the new COVID-19 protocols is something ABOVAS clients don't need to worry about.



As for or social accompaniments, 30% were for help doing the groceries, 27% for shopping and 11% for help going to the bank.

Our Volunteers, an essential part

of the well-being of our community

The majority of our 41 volunteers live in Pierrefonds/Roxboro at 19%, followed by Dollard-des-Ormeaux at 15% and 3 cities at 12% Beaconsfield, Kirkland and Pointe-Claire. An interesting observation is that 19% of our

volunteers come from outside of our territory

(from Pincourt, Vaudreuil-Dorion, Lasalle, Montréal and Saint-Laurent). Our volunteers have an **average age of 63 years old**. The **youngest** being **21 years** old and the oldest 87 years old.



The current hurdles regarding the provincial medical system's ways of doing things, is something that we can work around. However, our lack of volunteers is something that is more difficult to navigate. The Board and Executive Director are making this a priority because without volunteers, the mission of ABOVAS can no longer be supported. Therefore, in March, we did a publicity campaign through city electronic boards, newspapers and social media to recruit more volunteers and its slogan was, We have the CAUSE... You have the EFFECT!!! It brought us five new volunteers that have already started and there are 5 that we are still waiting on their SPVM background checks to be completed.

Our clients - our reason for being our commitment

Our coordinators, Isabelle Leclair and Monica Farag organized the perfect synchronization of the accompaniments and with the help of our dedicated volunteer companion drivers, offered an excellent customer service to our 854 clients






One can estimate that an identical number of people are indirectly beneficiaries of our service (caregiver of the accompanied person). These numbers, which come from a small organization, demonstrates that ABOVAS' service unquestionably is an essential accompaniment towards health and an important value to the West Island community.

An interesting fact about our clients is that over 95% of them are over the age of 60. The youngest being 23 years old



and the oldest is 102 years old.

Most of our clients live in Pointe-Claire at 32%, in Pierrefonds/Roxboro at 23%, followed by Dollard-des-Ormeaux at 13%.



We attended numerous virtual annual general meetings of our community partners like CRC, WICA, TCAIM and Volunteer West Island.


